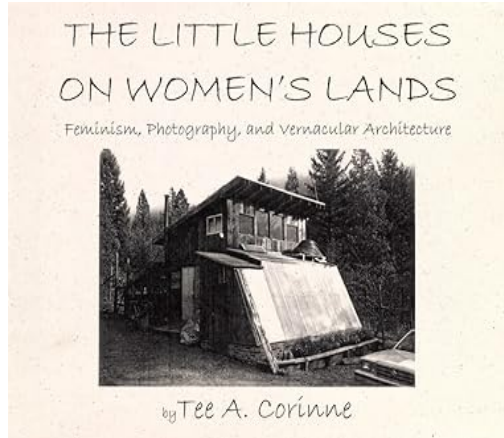

One of several small-run books (booklets?) printed on Tee Corinne's own Pearlchild press The Little Houses on Women's Lands is difficult to find but worthwhile for anyone interested in late 20th century lesbian/women's separatism back to the land movements and the second wave. **The Little Houses on Women's landslide** Mostly comprised of early 90s photos of buildings and other structures (gates gardens small bridges and the like) from seven different women's lands in Oregon these are contextualized by a trio of loving reflective essays as well as added comments from women whose voices as Corinne writes sing in the wind of these lands,
